





ICE collects data on every person it encounters, arrests, detains, transports via flight, and departs.

We recommend citing these data as “government data provided by ICE in response to a FOIA request to the Deportation Data Project and analyzed by [your organization].”

Latest data release

The most recent release of data covers ICE enforcement actions through late July 2025. We are actively seeking ongoing updates.

We include the **raw**, original data from ICE and, for arrests, a **processed**, cleaned version ([code](#)). The processed data includes an indicator for likely duplicates based on the arrest timing. We also provide a

Caveats galore!



We are not posting a removals dataset in this release because we found that it included far fewer records in 2025 than the previous release (in late June). We remain concerned that the [late June removals table](#) may not include all relevant records, and that associated fields in the other tables, such as the departure date, may also create an incomplete picture of removals. These concerns lead us to advise caution when performing any analysis of removals in any ICE data release in 2025. If you have insight into these problems or find other concerns, please let us know. We are actively seeking updated and corrected data.

How can I identify courtroom arrests in the data? 

How can I identify raids in communities in the data, as opposed to arrests at check-ins or a jail or prison? 

How can I tell whether detainees are honored by local and state jails and prisons?

In the UK the number of cases rose rapidly. But the public – and authorities – are only learning this now because these cases were only published now as a backlog.

The reason was apparently that the database is managed in Excel and the number of columns had reached the maximum.

A furious blame game is under way today after 16,000 coronavirus cases were missed due to a computer glitch - meaning thousands more potentially infected contacts were not traced.

The extraordinary meltdown is believed to have been caused by an Excel spreadsheet containing lab results reaching its maximum size, and failing to update.

Some 15,841 cases between September 25 and October 2 were not uploaded to the government dashboard.

As well as underestimating the scale of the outbreak in the UK, critically the details were not passed to contact tracers, meaning people exposed to the virus were not tracked down.

Work and Pensions Secretary Theresa Coffey conceded this morning that more Britons 'may well' have been infected due to the blunder.

The Data

This comes from the Deportation Data Project at the University of California Berkeley, School of Law. <https://deportationdata.org/data/ice.html>

You'd want to download the data files into your Google drive to process them. i typically download the zip file on my computer, these are text files and i save them as .csv files, then upload to google.

Also, it appears the unique identifiers, which are key, change with each release.

Arrests

This is the main table we are working with to start. From the description: "Records every time ICE arrests someone, whether or not that arrest results in a decision to detain the person; or issues a Notice to Appear (NTA), the document that starts a deportation case. Note that other agencies also issue NTAs, and those would not appear as arrests in this table. We treat "apprehensions," "arrests," and "administrative arrests" as synonyms."






To assess whether officiating is routinely impacting game outcomes, ESPN compiled every penalty that referees called in regular-season and postseason games between 2001 and 2024, the type of penalty assessed, when it occurred during the game, and which team went on to win. ESPN also compiled every challenge a head coach made in the regular season from 2010 to 2024 as noted in official NFL Game Books. Dr. James J. Cochran, professor of applied statistics in the Culverhouse College of Business at the University of Alabama, helped ESPN run an analysis.

Methods:

This story is based on data from the [Deportation Data Center](#) at the University of California, Berkeley School of Law.

Here's how we performed the analysis:

- Saved the tables as comma separated value (CSV) files.
- Imported them into a Jupyter notebook using the Python library Pandas.
- Narrowed the tables to data that included the Denver area of responsibility, Colorado or Wyoming.
- In the case of detention data, a list of detention facilities in Colorado and Wyoming were used.

- Using unique identifiers to match with detention data, added the most serious conviction charge to the arrest data.
- Using unique identifiers to match with detainer data, added conviction dates and additional state data to the arrest data.
- Narrowed the arrest data to the time frame of Jan. 20 to June 26 for both 2024 and 2025.
- Removed 41 records where the state could not be determined.
- Removed 28 duplicate records. Some duplicates in which individuals were arrested in both 2024 and 2025 remain in the data.
- Removed 25 records that appear to have come from other states.

- Used Excel pivot tables to analyze the remaining 2,718 records.

Some arrested people who were designated as having pending criminal charges at the time of their arrest had a conviction associated with them in the detention dataset. The Colorado Sun and WyoFile included those people, 17 in total, as having pending charges, so it is possible that our total number of convicted arrestees is an undercount.

It is worth noting that there is no way to gauge the accuracy of this data. For instance, three of the records removed listed locations in Colorado or Wyoming, but apprehension states of Florida and Utah.
